DID YOU KNOW...

The Middlesex Genealogical Society is one of only three genealogical societies in the state of Connecticut:

GENEALOGY PITFALLS

One of the problems that can occur in genealogical research was recently encountered by MGS member, George Cushman. He had procurred a birth certificate for his grandfather which had listed what seemed like a bonus - the name of his great-grandfather, Arvid Cushman, and his place of birth, Turner, Maine. Unfortunately, a request for more information sent to the Town Office in Turner came back - "No one by that name listed here."

There may be various reasons for this unhappy response. (1.) Arvid was actually born in some other small town in the area and someone mistakenly thought the birthplace was Turner. Remember, often the information on birth and death certificates is provided by persons present at the event who have no real knowledge of the personal background asked for about the individual involved (e.g. distant relatives or friends) or it is such a traumatic event that the information-provider is too distraught to think clearly. (2.) No one ever registered the event with a public official. Perhaps the birth was only recorded in a church record or in a family Bible or other private method. This is common in rural areas where it was often too much trouble to make a special trip into town just to register a birth. Often the event was registered months or years later, whenever the family got around to it, and then the information might not have been recalled accurately. (3.) The record actually is in the town's vital statistics but whoever looked for it failed to discover it. Perhaps it was misfiled, misspelled or the dates or names given were incorrect. Maybe the clerk was busy and didn't have enough time to search properly - or didn't know how to (these are elected officials who often know very little about what their records contain until they have been there awhile!). A personal search, if at all possible, should always be done to insure that all sources in the town's records have been checked. Sometimes items which a public official, however interested in your quest they may be, feels are irrelevant to your need and so does not send you, may actually provide valuable information. A personal search should be done at some time even if your request for information was favorably answered - perhaps there is more there!

Moral: Never be satisfied until all your sources have been exhausted completely.

CONNECTICUT STATE LIBRARY

The Connecticut State Library has a wealth of information for researchers of genealogical and Conn. historical material. It is located at 230 Capitol Ave., Hartford, directly across from the Capitol building. The hours are 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Mon.-Fri.; 9-1 on Sat. (except Saturdays which fall on holiday weekends). A cafeteria is available for lunch.

If this is your first visit, you will find your first half-hour will be spent dealing with security - filling out forms and obtaining a photo ID. The librarians, who were all extremely helpful and pleasant, will then give you an 8-page booklet entitled "A Guide to Genealogical Materials in the Connecticut State Library" which includes a floor plan of the Archives, History and Genealogy Section. This guide shows you how to use their facilities and saves many wasted hours. All materials, except the archival documents, are in open stacks and call slips are only needed for some of the microfilmed data. Security for the Archives, however, is quite strict and there are only four retrieval times per day, with a maximum of three items per time (no documents will be retrieved on Sat. without prior approval).

Some of the collections available to researchers are: Town Vital Records (Barbour Collection), Church Records, Family Bible Records, Cemetery Inscriptions, Newspaper Notices (Marriage and Death), CT Federal Census Records, Probate Records, Special Genealogical Collection (Manuscripts), Land Records, Military Service Records, Court Records, Maps, printed Genealogies and Town Histories. Photocopying machines are available for use by patrons but archival documents can only be photocopied by the staff.

The big problem at the State Library is lack of parking facilities. Two-hour parking is available on the street, but almost impossible to obtain after 7:30 a.m. There is a privately-owned parking garage a few blocks away but this is very costly. So, be aware of this problem before making the trip and allow for it.

WHEELER HELP

Descendants of Thomas Wheeler (wife, Elizabeth), who died in Bedford Co., "rginia in 1828, have formed a non-profit ganization to locate "the Lost Wheeler Cousins" and to publish the family's history. Their files contain 1000 family group sheets and their compiler, Mrs. Shirlee Hendrickson, Box 435, Bear River City, Utah 84301, answers all letters. If the information sent is not of their particular Wheeler line, she will try to connect it with others submitted.

The children of Thomas and Elizabeth Wheeler were: John, Lucy (Borden)*, William, Benjamin*, Peter, Thomas*, Sarah "Sally" (Cundiff), Joel, Gabriel, Joicy (Craig)* and James* (* means these lines are unknown). These children were born 20 June 1762 through 28 December 1788. They either stayed in Virginia or moved to Tennessee and "their descendants rapidly scattering to the South, or to the new frontiers in the North and West".

The information on this Wheeler organization is at least $1\frac{1}{2}$ years old so the addresses may not be up to date. However, if you think you may have a relationship with this family it would be

rth your while to contact them. Apparently the group is also trying to determine Thomas' family background. It is a possibility that he was a native of Connecticut or some other Northern state since it has been ascertained that he was not of Maryland or Virginia stock.

DID YOU KNOW...

The Barbour Collection, a compilation of abstracts of all Connecticut town vital records, is available on microfilm at the Ferguson Library in Stamford. These records, which go up to about 1850, include births, marrages and deaths. They are an invaluable source for those with any Connecticut ancestry. Ask at the Reference Desk upstairs in the Library. You will fill out a call slip and the material you need can be retrieved either by surname or town.

POLISH GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

For anyone with Polish family ties there is now help in the form of the National Society for Polish Genealogy. There is quite a rich Polish heritage in this country with many descendants of Polish immigrants now trying to trace their roots. With Poland, as with other Eastern Bloc countries, any attempt at research from a resident outside its borders is usually met with red tape and frustration, if not actual denial of any assistance. 
Please help us expand our genealogical services and submit whatever research you have completed up to this time. We are also looking for volunteers to assist in compiling and indexing the material for this project.
