Sources at NEHGS [New England Historic Genealogical Society] for the "Old Northwest" by Jane Bramwell

The Northwest Territory, or the "Old Northwest" — now the states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin and part of Minnesota — was first opened to European settlement by the French in the seventeenth century. In the decades immediately before the Revolution this region was a bloody battleground among the native Americans, the French, and the British colonies of North America. In 1783, by the Treaty of Paris, the land west of the Ohio River was ceded by Great Britain to the new United States. In 1787 the Congress of the Confederation created the Northwest Territory.

In the aftermath of the Revolution, people from the crowded eastern states poured by the thousands into the Old Northwest. The next fifty years was a time of constantly shifting territorial, state, and county boundaries. Land was purchased from private land companies as well as from the federal government and the infant states. Research must thus often be conducted in several archives. For example, before Wisconsin became a state in 1838, it had been part of the Northwest Territory, the Indiana Territory, the Illinois Territory, the Michigan territory, and its own Wisconsin Territory — each with a different center of government and record keeping. As in all frontier areas, registration of births, deaths, and marriages, complete church records and intact tombstones with clear inscriptions were a rarity. Fortunately the frontier period in the Old Northwest passed at about the same time that the Civil War and the issues leading to it crystallized our national consciousness.

Ohio, the first state born of the Old Northwest, was admitted to the Union in 1803. It is rightly regarded as the crossroads of the future United States — parts of it were settled primarily by settlers from New England, New York and Pennsylvania (and many from the latter two states were New England - derived), while other areas bear the influence of people who moved north from Virginia, Kentucky and North Carolina especially.

Indiana, also a crossroads, became a state in 1816. As happened in Ohio, many settlers migrating from the Northeast and Southeast moved into Indiana for a generation or two, then headed further west. Illinois gained statehood in 1818, shortly after Indiana. Almost two decades passed before Michigan became a state in 1837. Except for a small part of present-day Minnesota the remainder of the Old Northwest became the state of Wisconsin in 1848.



Marianne Sheldon Updates the Records of the Old Burying Grounds of Darien


Shortly after the Darien Historical Society was established in 1953, the many small family cemeteries became a concern. Most were not being cared for at all and many were subject to vandalism. The Society purchased photostatic copies of records of all the gravestones in Darien cemeteries from the Connecticut State Library. These records had been compiled by a Public Works Administration project in 1934 and 1935. The copies were bound in three volumes and exist today in the DHS library.

A large committee of DHS members was formed and each cemetery visited. The location and condition of each was noted in a report made to First Selectman, Thomas Kerrigan, in late 1959 with a request for better cemetery upkeep from the Dept. of Public Works. In most cases, no attempt was made by the committee members to verify the 1934 PWA records.

About two years ago, Marianne Sheldon began visiting each of these cemeteries to check their condition and verify the PWA records. Unfortunately, she found that more than 30 years later, the condition of most of these cemeteries has not improved. In fact, some of them have, thus far, been impossible to even find and may be lost forever. Even if found, many are overgrown with brush and stones are askew and, in many instances, the PWA records have been found to be less than accurate.

In the Summer 1989 MGS Newsletter, the Platt Cemetery - Property #30, and the Bell Cemetery - Property #8 were published. Beginning in this issue of the newsletter, we will again publish Marianne's findings on these cemeteries. This was both a labor of love and frustration for Marianne as she attempted to find these cemeteries and document her findings. We all appreciate these original records she has verified.





THE RESEARCHER'S CORNER **Determining Family**

Relationships With Deeds





- 2. Identify and list those individuals of the same surname who purchased property in the same geographical vicinity of the individual who is the target of your research. Use a land mark, such as a creek or river, a town site, common neighbors, land description in either metes and bounds. quadrangle, lots, etc.
- 3. Prepare a deed index that lists all the land transactions in a county by a given surname. starting with the first transaction of that surname and inclusive of the time period that is relevant to the search objective.
 - a) Include Grantee, Grantor, date of deed, date of recordation. Volume and page location in Deed Book, number of acres, description of property.
 - b) If you have a computer this can be done with a database that gives you a sort option. In addition to previously mentioned fields, it can be beneficial to create a field for cost of property, names of witnesses, names of adjoining landowners as mentioned in the deed 4. Organize the deed index chronologically; note those transactions that took place between two census years. This provides clues to the names listed on the census, as well as their relationships.
- 5. Compare a chronological time-line of deed information to the information listed on the census, starting with the earliest entry of that surname.
- 6. Compare the deed information to vital records information found on marriage, birth, death, and probate information, include other court records.
- 7. Read each of the deeds for that surname thoroughly and abstract important facts.
- 8. It is usually necessary to re-read the deeds after this analysis process has been done. You will find clues that you did not notice on the first goaround. You are more familiar with the activity of the family and will pick-up additional clues.
- 9. Compile a family pedigree, documenting all known information in chronological format.


