# DONALD HANRAHAN ON IWO JIMA\*

We remember in February and March 2015 the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the battle for Iwo Jima. My eldest brother, Donald Hanrahan, was there with the 4th Marine Division. He celebrated his 20th

birthday on the island.

When our mother's apartment was cleared out 26 years ago he learned that the letters he had written home during his World War II service still existed, along with their accompanying drawings. (Few of Donald's letters home arrived without one or more of his



drawings.) That discovery gave him the nudge he needed to begin writing a memoir for his children and grandchildren about his military service, both in the Marine Corps during W.W. II as an enlisted man and in the Naval Reserve from the Korean conflict on through many years as an officer. He distributed this memoir with copies of his artwork to family members some time ago. The document then resided for many years in his computer, until one of his granddaughters had it printed shortly before Christmas 2014 as a book, illustrated with his drawings. Four days after Christmas Donald passed away.



# DAR MAKES CONTRIBUTED SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION AVAILABLE TO RE-SEARCHERS ONLINE

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) (http://www.dar.org/) has announced a new feature of its Genealogical Research (http://services.dar.org/public/ System (GRS) dar research/search/?tab id=0). This new Supporting (http://services.dar.org/Public/ Documents DAR Research/record copy/?action=overview) feature allows users to purchase documents that were submitted with previously verified DAR membership and supplemental applications. These documents may include family bible records, deeds, wills and other various materials used to prove lineage to a patriot of the American Revolution.

The GRS is a free resource provided by the DAR to aid general genealogical research and to assist with the DAR membership process. It is a collection of databases that provide access to the many materials amassed by the DAR since its founding in 1890.

GRS users have long been able to purchase Record Copies (previously verified DAR membership and supplemental applications), which show the lineage going back to the ancestor who contributed to the American Revolution, but before now the documents which were submitted to support the Record Copy were not available for purchase online. Now these supporting documents are available on demand for the user to purchase either in conjunction with a Record Copy or separate from the application with which it is associated.

Record Copies and Supporting Documents are now part of the DAR Online Library Documents Service. This service allows researchers to select an application or Supporting Documents (if they are available), pay by credit card, and instantly download the document as an Adobe PDF document. It is important to note that any applications or vital records (birth, death, marriage, divorce or other sensitive documentation) that are less than 100 years old will not be available in an effort to keep personal information confidential.

# How does the DAR Online Library Documents Service work?

1. Search the DAR Genealogical Research System.

- 2. Where you see a green "Purchase" or "\$" button, click on it to add the record to your shopping cart. You may purchase more than one record copy at a time. If a record doesn't have a green button, it is unavailable, pending review.
- 3. If supporting documents are also available, an option will appear to add those to your order after you click on the "Purchase" button.
- 4. Pay online using Visa or MasterCard via our secure payment system.
- Use the link(s) provided on the payment confirmation screen to access and download your document(s). You will also receive an email receipt with the same information.
- Download the purchased document(s) to your computer. All files are in an Adobe Acrobat Portable Document Format (PDF) and you will need Adobe Reader to view them.
- 7. Purchased documents can be downloaded for a period of one week after purchase.
- Please note, all record copy and supporting documents fees are non-refundable, and no substitutions will be made.

Researchers now have the ability to purchase Record Copies for \$10, Supporting Documents for \$20 or both for \$30. Before purchasing a Record Copy the user has the ability to preview the document, unfortunately, this feature will not be available for the Supporting Documents. The user will be able to see how many pages are included for the Supporting Documents, but not the exact types of documents it contains. Access to these Supporting Documents may serve as a useful genealogical research tool and may be used as documentation for a new application or for general genealogy purposes.
